## Dear Friends and Colleagues

**Looking back at 2019, I am happy to report on the Bitou 10 Education and Development Foundation's growing stature, both in terms of our financial status and our educational contribution toward education and development in Bitou schools.**

We managed to expand our programmes to reach more learners and teachers and brought in enrichment tools for education such as the Mathematics and Spelling Stars competitions.

A tragic accident marred our good fortune when two of our staff members were involved in a serious accident in August 2019. A heavy school gate came loose and fell on our Manager and one of our mentors. Unfortunately, our Manager, Sooneela Naina, was seriously injured and had to be hospitalised. Our mentor managed to get off with less serious injuries but quite traumatised.

Sooneela's leg was broken and she has been unable to walk without a walking frame since. She suffered severe pain and complications from the badly broken leg and was booked off sick until May 2020. Sooneela is going back for another operation, as I am writing this report, and we can only hope that she will recuperate fully after this.

It speaks to the competence of our staff, both Sooneela, as the manager and Madeleen Janse van Vuuren, the administration officer, that our operational work could proceed without much of a hitch up to the end of the year.

I want to thank Madeleen and our expert co-ordinators and facilitators, as well as our many volunteers, who worked hard to make a success of the academic year in spite of the fact that the manager was absent towards the end of the year.

Thank you to our many funders, supporters and friends from this community who made it possible for us to deliver on our credo of supporting schooling for excellence. Without your contributions we could not do any of this work.



# Early Childhood Development

## ECD Level 5 Bursaries

**Background:** A partnership with The Teacher's Learning Center (TLC), an accredited institution based in Johannesburg, enabled 10 ECD practitioners to be trained by Susan le Roux, ECD trainer, in Plettenberg Bay. The programme duration was 18 months, beginning in February 2018 and ending in October 2019.

The ladies attended weekly sessions at St. Peter's Catholic Church. The bursary is all inclusive, covering registration, tuition and stationery.

**Outcomes:** Eight bursary recipients successfully completed the 18-month training.

The Bitou 10 Foundation and the Teachers Learning Center



awarded the students on Monday, 18th November 2019, at the Bitou 10 office.

We wish our Level 5 bursary recipients the best of luck as they embark on providing quality education in the ECD sector.

# Literacy Development

## 1. Reading and English Programme

**Background:** This Literacy Programme is based on and inspired by the Shine Centre in Cape Town. The programme involves all the Grade 3 learners in both Phakamisani and Kwanokuthula Primary School. The programme includes reading, writing and conversation, which supports Grade 3 learners to effectively access the curriculum in Grade 4, when the medium of instruction changes from isiXhosa to English.

**Outcomes:** 72 volunteers from the Plettenburg Bay community availed themselves to provide reading sessions for learners. We appreciate their time, enthusiasm and dedication.

With twice termly diagnostic assessments which highlight strengths and weaknesses, each child works at their own pace through the six levels of reading and phonics. The teachers have



reported that the children are transferring these new foundation skills back into the classroom and reading is also improving in their home language.

At Kwanokuthula Primary, we have assisted the Grade 3 English class prepare for the WCED Systemic Evaluation and the Grade 2 English class with literacy skills.

The End of Year coffee morning was a great success and we thank Nguni Restaurant for laying on this celebration 'free of charge' again this year.

# Literacy Development

## 2. Ready Steady Read

### Write

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**Background: The Bitou 10 Foundation identified a need for an intervention which focuses on nurturing the learners to support early reading and writing.**

In partnership with Wordworks, we implemented the Ready Steady Read Write Programme at Kranshoek and Harkerville Primary, for Grade R and Grade 1 learners. These schools are Afrikaans medium schools and, as such, the Wordworks programme is designed to assist learners specifically with early literacy skills in Afrikaans.

**Outcomes:** Volunteers (tutors) from the community received a two-day training session, conducted by Sooneela Naina and Anthea Wiesie, Wordworks programme co-ordinators.

All learners were assessed before, during and after the intervention to monitor their progress during the year. The learners received weekly sessions to enhance vocabulary, reading and writing skills. The 45-minute sessions are interactive and fun, allowing the learners to



engage with a variety of learning materials and resources.

A tutor from Kranshoek, Mariana Ambraal, attended a 3-day co-ordinator training at Wordworks in Cape Town. She co-ordinated the programme at Kranshoek.

The programme has also benefited the tutors, who availed themselves weekly to promote reading and writing in their communities. Learners identify with them and see them as role models within their community. Tutors have commented that they feel a sense of purpose by volunteering in the programme.

In November, the learners and tutors were awarded with certificates of participation, at a ceremony held at both Kranshoek

# Literacy Development

## 3. Bitou Spelling Stars

**Background:** The aim of the initiative is to provide all learners with the opportunity to improve reading and language skills in English, Afrikaans and isiXhosa, and to build self-esteem.

The initiative was organised by B10F, Kwanokuthula Library and teacher representatives from the participating schools, Kwanokuthula Primary, Kranshoek Primary, Formosa Primary, Plettenburg Bay Primary, Phakamisani Primary and The Craggs Primary.

**Outcomes:** All learners from Grade 1 to Grade 7, from the above-mentioned schools, participated in internal school challenges.

Selected learners then participated in the inter-school



event, hosted at Kwanokuthula Primary (English and isiXhosa) and Formosa Primary (Afrikaans).

All learners received a certificate for their participation. The top three learners, in each grade per language, were awarded with a medal at the Awards Ceremony held at the Piesang Valley Community Hall on 24 October 2019.

Kwanokuthula Primary won the isiXhosa division and Plettenberg Bay Primary won the English and Afrikaans divisions.

# Mathematics Development

## 1. Intersen Phase (Grade 4)


**Background:** The Mathematics Development Programme is a 3-year plan aimed at working with Grade 4 learners and following their development until Grade 6. Mathematics teachers will be supported and guided by contracted Mathematics teaching mentors, Dianne de Villiers, Gillian Reid and Hanlie Botha, to enhance curriculum planning and assessment.

**Five primary schools (Figure 1) were included in the programme.**

**Outcomes:** Each Grade 4 Mathematics class was visited for one hour per week. Teachers were assisted with best practice teaching methodologies, demonstration lessons and how to incorporate mathematics resources into lessons. Assessments were conducted to evaluate learner progress, before and after the intervention.

The assessment was based on the CAPS curriculum and covered the main topics such as Whole Numbers, Place Value, the 4 Operations, Common Fractions, Decimals and Data Handling.

The results of the assessment is reflective of the many challenges facing education today:

1. Many teachers are faced with classes of fifty learners, causing discipline problems and disruptions during teaching and learning time. This has been the greatest challenge thus far in the programme. Different approaches were adopted including advise on time management and classroom management and organisation.
2. Language is a barrier to learning with many learners not understanding mathematical concepts, vocabulary and problems.
3. Learners perform better when completing continuous assessment tasks throughout the year rather than 2 assessments, at the beginning and end of the year.
4. New teachers, in their first year of teaching, needed coaching and guidance regarding classroom management and how to administer effective discipline in the classroom.

# Mathematics Development (continued)

## 2. SA Mathematics Challenge

**Background:** The challenge focuses on learner participation, ensuring that more learners enjoy Mathematics and participates in the Challenge. Presently over 110 000 learners from more than 500 schools participate every year. The aim is to assist South Africans to become empowered, independent, creative and critical thinkers

**Outcomes:** 496 Grade 4 learners from Harkerville, Kranshoek, Kwanokuthula and Formosa Primary Schools participated in Round 1 this year. The Challenge consists of two rounds and each paper is an hour long, consisting of 20 multiple choice questions.



13 Formosa Primary and 5 Kwanokuthula Primary learners achieved over 50% and competed in Round 2, which was written at Formosa Primary on 18 July 2019.

# Mathematics Development (continued)

## 3. Professional Learning Communities

**Background:** Professional Learning Communities were established to provide a platform for teachers to share their best practice teaching methods, to discuss planning and demonstrate the use of resource materials in the classroom.

**Outcomes:** Dianne de Villiers and Gillian Reid created a friendly and fun environment for teachers to participate and share their teaching experiences. Teachers were able to share their successes and challenges and to use this information in their classrooms. The Mathematics mentors were able to share fun games to improve learners



understanding of mathematical concepts. Mathematical concepts and teaching methodologies were demonstrated by using a variety of mathematics resources.

**Total number of beneficiaries: 7 Grade 4 Mathematics teachers**

# Science Enrichment

## Grahamstown Science Fair

**Background:** This initiative was inspired by a local medical professional whose passion is to promote the field of Science amongst the youth of Plettenberg Bay. Local funders have sponsored this initiative to afford learners an opportunity to engage with the sciences and to experience a world beyond Plettenberg Bay.

**Of the group of learners who visited the Grahamstown Science Fair in 2017, all 8 learners are now pursuing careers in the Science field.**

**Outcomes:** 6 Matriculants from Murray High were accompanied by Mr. Bobi (Principal) and Mrs. Tyontwana (Head of Department) to attend the Grahamstown Science Fair, from 8 March to 11 March. They spent 3 nights and 4 days in Grahamstown, attending various lectures and workshops.

### Conclusion:

**Total number of beneficiaries: 6 Matriculants and 2 teachers**



Mr. Bobi commented that the learners had had an amazing experience at the Science Fair. They returned enriched and enthusiastic about pursuing a career in the Sciences. Visiting the Eastern Cape was a new experience, which opened their eyes to a greater world beyond Plettenberg Bay.

# Youth Development

## Khanya Programme

**Background:**The Khanya Programme is a mentorship programme which aims to provide life skills training for selected Grade 11 learners from Murray High and Plettenberg Bay Secondary.

The program is based on value systems such as appreciation, integrity, accountability, diligence, perseverance and discipline.

**Outcomes:** Delnay Terblanche (co-ordinator) provided learners with two weekly sessions at each school. Some topics discussed at each session:

- Self Esteem and Boundaries
- Anger Conflict and Assertiveness
- Addictions
- Violence and abuse
- Mental Health
- Personal Safety and Self Defence
- CV Writing and Interview do's and Don'ts
- Computer Skills



- One on one counselling sessions
- Aptitude and Personality tests
- Exam Tips and Tricks
- Teambuilding

The learners from Murray High spent their holiday at Masizame, an orphanage in Kwanokuthula. They were humbled by this experience and commented that the time spent at Masizame taught them about gratitude and giving back to their communities.

It was an empowering experience for the Khanya learners and each were awarded with a certificate from Masizame.

As a result, significant impact was achieved in 2019:

- ECD – 8 ECD practitioners completed Level 5 training
- Literacy development – 160 Grade 3 isiXhosa speaking learners & 84 Grade 1 and R Afrikaans speaking learners greatly improved their literacy skills, while 4 760 learners from Grades 1 – 7 participated in the second Bitou Spelling Stars inter-school competition
- Mathematics development – 682 learners made significant progress in their mathematics ability, with their respective Mathematics teachers gaining valuable new teaching skills & experience
- Science Enrichment – 6 Matriculants and 2 teachers attended the Grahamstown Science Fair
- Youth development – 18 Grade 11 learners received life skills training to provide them with essential skills when embarking on a tertiary qualification

We will continue to review and discuss our programmes with the Bitou principals and management teams to ensure that we provide initiatives to meet the needs of our Bitou learners. A need then arises to establish our organisation, nationally and internationally to meet the needs within our schools.

2019 has been a successful year for the organisation, as new funders and partners joined us in achieving 'schooling for excellence' in Bitou.
